

McKee 2009, Denialism

- 1. Identify a conspiracy among scientists, to promote some agenda
- 2. Use fake experts; denigrate legitimate experts
- 3. Cherry-pick from the literature; find fault with papers to discredit the field
- 4. Set impossible expectations for the science
- 5. Use misrepresentation and logical fallacies.
